Project Eligibility

Must Satisfy 3 Criteria

 Fit into 1 of 12 Categories of Transportation Enhancements Eligible Activities

Relate to surface transportation

Provide public use

12 Categories

I. Pedestrian & Bicycle Facilities

- New or reconstructed sidewalks
- Curb ramps
- Bike lane striping
- Widen paved shoulders
- Bike parking
- Bus bicycle racks
- Off-road non-motorized trails
- Bike/pedestrian bridges & underpasses







II. Pedestrian and Bike Safety & Educational Activities

- Educational programs to encourage safe walking and bicycling such as:
 - Classes
 - Pamphlets/maps
 - Safety campaigns

III. Acquisition of Scenic or Historic Easements and Sites

- Acquisition of scenic land easements, vistas and landscapes
- Purchase of buildings in historic districts or historic properties
- Preservation of farmland

IV. Scenic or Historic Highway Programs including Tourist and Welcome Centers

- Overlooks
- Visitor centers
- Viewing areas
- Designation signs and markers



V. Landscaping & Scenic Beautification

Along streets, historic highways, trails and waterfronts the following items are eligible:

- Street furniture
- Street lighting
- Public art
- Gateways along highways
- Landscaping





VI. Historic Preservation

- Preservation of buildings & facades in historic districts
- Rehabilitation & operation of historic buildings for transportation-related purposes
- Access improvements to historic sites
 & buildings

VII. Rehabilitation & Operation of Historic Transportation Buildings, Structures & Facilities

- Restoration of railroad depots, bus stations, lighthouses, canal facilities
- Rehabilitation of rail trestles, tunnels and bridges

VIII. Conversion of Abandoned Railway Corridors to Trails

- Acquiring railroad rights-of-way
- Planning, designing and constructing multi-use trails
- Developing rail-to-trail projects





IX. Inventory, Control and Removal of Outdoor Advertising

- Billboard inventories
- Removal of illegal and non-conforming billboards

X. Archaeological Planning & Research

- Research, preservation planning and interpretation
- Developing interpretive signs, exhibits and guides
- Inventories and surveys



XI. Environmental Mitigation of Highway Runoff Pollution & Provision of Wildlife Connectivity

- Runoff pollution studies
- Soil erosion controls
- Detention and sediment basins
- River clean-ups
- Wildlife crossings

XII. Establishment of Transportation Museums

- Construction of transportation museums
- Additions to existing transportation museums

Project Must Relate to Surface Transportation (TEP Annual Allocations = 10 Percent of Statewide STP Funding)

KEY TRANSP. RELATIONSHIP CRITERIA

- Serves a current or past transportation purpose
- Proximity to highway or pedestrian/bicycle corridor
- Enhancement of aesthetic, cultural or historic aspects of the travel experience

Project Must Have Public Use

Answer these questions:

- What access would the public have to the project site, building, facility or structure? If limited, why?
- What are the hours, days, or seasons of operation? Is the facility open enough to justify the public investment?
- Will portions of the project site, building or facility be restricted to private or commercial use?

Examples of Public Benefits

- Support context-sensitive solutions
- Foster safety, accessibility and environmental preservation
- Boost local economies
- Improve the transportation experience by strengthening multi-modal systems
- Increase partnerships between state & local agencies
- Strengthen public role in local and state transportation planning

Who Can Be an Applicant? Who Can Be a Sponsor? What is the Difference?

SPONSOR

- Must be a governmental agency
 - County
 - City, Village or Town
 - State agency
- Must be willing and able to take responsibility for <u>all</u> project development activities

<u>APPLICANT</u>

- Can be the same entity as the sponsor (e.g. county, city, village, town, state agency) or a different entity (e.g. a not-for-profit organization)
- Has a stake in the project's funding and/or implementation

MULTIPLE AGENCIES

- When applicant is *different* from sponsor, sponsor is tasked with defining each entity's role via an agreement, which should be completed before any federal aid eligible work is started
- When more than one sponsor is involved in a project, one sponsor must be designated as the <u>lead</u> sponsor

SPONSOR'S RESPONSIBILITIES

- TE sponsor will enter into a legal project agreement with NYSDOT which defines our respective roles
- Sponsor is responsible for paying all project expenses first before applying to NYSDOT for reimbursement of the eligible federal aid share



Financing TEP Projects



GENERAL INFORMATION

□ TE Program is a <u>reimbursement</u> program, **not** a grant program

□ TE funds can be used for Design, Environmental Studies, Property Acquisition, Construction & Construction Inspection



Project Funding Shares

- □ TE project funding consists of two parts
 - Federal share < 80%</p>
 - Non-federal share ≥ 20%

MAXIMUM & MINIMUM PARTICIPATION

- All proposed projects must have a minimum total cost of \$100,000
- □ The <u>maximum</u> federal share for any TE project is <u>fixed</u> at \$2,000,000



KEY RULES

- NYSDOT expects TE projects to be delivered at same scope as approved
- Approved TE projects have the federal funding share fixed at application stage
- TE funding for a project is capped at approval
- □ Good, detailed cost estimates at the project planning/funding application stage are essential!



PROJECT PROGRESS EXPECTATIONS

- □ Every TE project is expected to progress through development in a reasonable time frame (e.g. within 5 yrs. of approval)
- Failure to deliver project within a reasonable time frame may result in withdrawal of federal funds by NYSDOT.

2006 - Round 1 Information

- Total 2006 Program Funds Equal \$67.4 Million (SAFETEA-LU Plus TEA-21 Balance);
- Funds are typically distributed geographically via a "TEP Formula" that has heretofore been based on population and STP lane miles (50/50);
- Projects programmed from "Regional/MPO Priority Lists"; and,
- Final approval for priority projects comes from the Transportation Enhancements Advisory Committee (TEAC).
