Solar & Agriculture Addressed in Upcoming Workshop

A land use training workshop sponsored by Oneida-Herkimer Comprehensive Planning Program will take place on Thursday, June 9, 2016 from 5 pm to 8:45 pm at the Utica campus of Mohawk Valley Community College.

Two topics will be covered: Solar Energy Regulation and Balancing Agriculture and Related Uses in the Community. The solar portion will address the authority of local governments to regulate photovoltaic solar systems from modest residential and agricultural systems to large scale institutional and commercial solar arrays and sun farms. Environmental and economic benefits and aesthetic challenges will also be discussed, as well as tools such as the New York State Unified Solar Permit are provided to allow solar arrays and regulate their impacts.

The agricultural portion will cover certain farm related uses in state Agricultural Districts and explore some of the agricultural uses and scenarios in which local governments' ability to regulate them through zoning is limited.

RACOG Approves Deferiet as New Member

On May 11, members of RACOG unanimously approved a formal request by the village of Deferiet to become a member of the organization based upon a "shared local and regional interest in enhancing sustainable opportunities that support RACOG initiatives — i.e. infrastructure & waterfront development; shared planning & zoning boards; and exploring more cost effective and efficient opportunities to provide services to residents."

Currently, Deferiet is working with the town of Wilna, village of Carthage, Attorney Mark Gebo, Tug Hill Commission Director of Planning Phil Street and RACOG Circuit Rider Kathy Amyot to form a shared planning board to maximize efficiencies and effectiveness. As a new member of RACOG, the village is also planning to work towards becoming a sitting member on the Joint Zoning Board of Appeals.

In preparing to add Deferiet as a new member to RACOG on June 1st, the Inter-municipal Agreement is being reviewed by the respective boards for authorization.

Leyden Plan Nearing Completion

The town of Leyden planning board is wrapping up work on a new comprehensive plan. Members have been meeting monthly over the past year analyzing community indicators and brainstorming on opportunities to improve the town. The first public hearing on the plan was held May 5th. After review by the Lewis County Planning Board, the plan will be finalized and adopted by the town board this summer.

Grant Applications Available

Forest Service Great Lakes Restoration Initiative Grant

The 2016 round of Great Lakes Restoration Initiative funding through the US Forest Service is now open, with applications due June 21, 2016. This year's priorities are:

- 1) restore tree canopy lost to infestation by emerald ash borer;
- 2) create or improve green infrastructure through the planting of trees and other vegetation as part of a local management strategy to maintain and enhance urban watersheds; and
- 3) restore the structure and function of coastal wetlands and lake-affected riparian areas through planting of native trees and diverse vegetation.

Projects must be located within the Great Lakes watershed and be endorsed by the NY State Forester. Last year the Jefferson County Soil & Water Conservation District, as the applicant on behalf of the Jefferson County Stormwater Coalition, successfully secured \$175,000 to plant trees and build rain gardens in the participating communities.

Community Connect Grant Program

The USDA Rural Development Community Connect Grant program helps fund broadband deployment into rural communities where it is not yet economically viable for private sector providers to deliver service.

The construction, acquisition, or leasing of facilities, spectrum, land or buildings used to deploy broadband service for:

- all residential and business customers located within the Proposed Funded Service Area (PFSA)
- all participating critical community facilities (such as public schools, fire stations and public libraries)
- the cost of providing broadband service free of charge to the critical commu nity facilities for 2 years

Less than 10% of the grant amount or up to \$150,000 may be used for the improvement, expansion, construction or acquisition of a community center that provides online access to the public.

Swim Lessons Planned for Summer

Working together with the Carthage YMCA, Carthage Central High School and the villages of Carthage and West Carthage and towns of Champion and Wilna, RACOG approved a contract with the YMCA to provide swim lessons through the American Red Cross Swim Program at its May 11th meeting. The shared service effort provides area families and youth with supervised recreational activities throughout the summer season by maximizing limited local resources.

In addition, members of RACOG operate and maintain an outdoor swim & recreation park at the Joint Village Swim Pool in West Carthage. Managed by the village of West Carthage according to the Department of Health regulations, an ad hoc committee was appointed in 2015 to develop formal guidelines that regulate day-to-day operations and maintenance of the pool.

According to the end of the year report by the village recreation directors and representatives, pool operation was more efficient and effective than previous years. In preparation for the 2016 Summer Recreation Program to begin, members of the ad hoc committee will reconvene to review existing guidelines and explore options and opportunities to enhance existing services.
