NYSERDA Grants for Solar Energy Projects - PON 2589

The New York State Energy Research and Development Authority (NYSERDA) has announced its **New York Sun Competitive Photovoltaic (PV) Program**. NYSERDA invites proposals for the installation of customer-sited PV projects in New York Independent System Operator load zones A through J and Renewable Biogas-fueled electric generation projects in load zones G through J. Proposals Due:

November 8, 2012, by 5:00 PM Eastern Time

March 14, 2013, by 5:00 PM Eastern Time

Complete proposals that demonstrate project viability and capability will be competitively selected based on their incentive bid in dollars per kilowatt hour (\$/kWh). All projects must be installed within eight (8) months of the award date.

NYSERDA will conduct teleconferences for prospective Applicants on **January 17, 2013 and May 23, 2013 at 11am EST**. On each teleconference, NYSERDA will review the PON requirements and address questions. Those who wish to participate in the teleconference must send an email indicating such to PON2589@nyserda.org, by **12:00 noon EST on January 10, 2013, and/or May 16, 2013**, with the subject line "Bidders' Teleconference." The Tug Hill Core Forest remains an area dominated by native species with relatively little impacts from many invasive species. Because of this, an Invasive Species Prevention Zone (ISPZ) was established to monitor and prevent the establishment of high-priority invasive species within the Tug Hill Core Forest. To further outreach efforts about the ISPZ, the St. Lawrence Eastern Lake Ontario (SLELO) Partnership for Regional Invasive Species Management (PRISM) has produced a two page color brochure describing the Tug Hill ISPZ in terms of where it is and what it does. 2012 Black River Trash Bash

The Black River, winding from Forestport to Dexter, is one of the North Country's most important natural resources. The Black River Trash Bash is a watershed-wide event to clean up along the river and document what litters our shores. Data will be compiled and sent to the American Littoral Society (ALS), which will use the data to devise strategies to combat pollution. We also hope to increase public participation in solving the problem of litter and pollution and to increase public awareness and appreciation of the River.

This event is being sponsored in part by the ALS, which conducts an annual world-wide beach cleanup day. The event is being organized locally by the Lewis County Soil and Water Conservation District and the Tug Hill Commission. Many thanks go out to the captains of the cleanup sites. Lake Ontario Visioning Workshops Announced

Citizens living along Lake Ontario and its tributaries are being invited to provide input at a series of six Lake Ontario Basin Communities Visioning for a Healthy Lake workshops September 24-29. The Finger Lakes – Lake Ontario Watershed Protection Alliance (FLLOWPA) and New York Sea Grant are holding the workshops in Lyndonville, Piffard, Webster, Henderson, Sodus, and Oswego to provide information on issues related to Lake Ontario and its priority tributaries, including the Genesee and Oswego Rivers, and to gather input from the public on lake basin conditions and priorities for a healthy lake system.

Workshop discussion will include review of the current Bi-National Lake Ontario Lakewide Management Plan and Lake Ontario Area of Concern Remedial Action Plans. The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation will present its Great Lakes Basin Action Agenda and the Agenda's 13 priorities will frame discussions and small group work sessions.

2013 ArtPlace Grants

ArtPlace, a collaboration of 11 major national and regional foundations, six of the nation's largest banks, and eight federal agencies including the National Endowment for the Arts to accelerate creative placemaking across the U.S., has just launched its third round of grant applications to support creative placemaking in cities and towns across America. To date, ArtPlace has awarded \$26.9 million in grants – in amounts up to \$1 million – to 76 organizations in 46 communities across the country, including several projects in rural communities.

Creative placemaking has been gaining traction as a locally-driven strategy for bringing new life to communities of all sizes. ArtPlace defines creative placemaking as “a means of investing in art and culture at the heart of a portfolio of integrated strategies that can drive vibrancy and diversity so powerful that it transforms communities.”

Grants will be awarded to projects that involve arts organizations, artists and designers working in partnership with local and national partners to produce transformative impacts on community vibrancy.
