NYS POLLUTION PREVENTION INSTITUTE COMMUNITY GRANTS DUE OCTOBER 22, 2010

The New York State Pollution Prevention Institute (NYSP2I) is inviting proposals from community organizations, municipal departments, and other public sector and nonprofit entities for support under the Community Grants Program.

The goal of this program is to provide financial and technical support for projects that raise awareness and understanding of pollution prevention practices and lead to implementation at the local level. The program aims to improve the health, environmental quality, and economic vitality of New York State communities. Applications are available at: www.nysp2i.rit.edu and are due October 22.

Eligible organizations are community organizations with a focus in environmental. public health. or occupational health protection; neighborhood associations; environmental justice organizations; community development corporations; health centers; local unions and labor organizations. Community organizations do not need to be 501(c)(3) organization however, all community organizations must submit a W-9 form with their application.

Additionally, local government agencies are eligible, and consist of offices or departments of a city, town, county, or primary and secondary school in New York State. Specifically these may

include but are not limited to: local environmental agencies, boards of health, departments of public works, local emergency response offices, town commissions, planning and zoning boards, libraries, and schools.

SUNY OSWEGO TO STUDY TUG HILL SNOWFALL

SUNY Oswego recently announced that they have received an \$86,000 grant to study lake effect snowfall. The grant will go in part toward a mobile Doppler radar unit which will be able to capture details about lake effect snowfall. The objective of the demonstration project is to show that the mobile radar unit can effectively capture valuable data on the composition of the type of snowfall in snowstorms east of Lake Ontario where accumulations can be measured in feet, not inches.

SUNY Oswego estimates that "Data analysis and writing for the project will take place next spring and summer, followed by publication and conference presentations in Year Two of the grant."

CELEBRATE THE BLACK RIVER!

Show your community support and love of the Black River and join us for this watershed-wide event to clean up trash and debris along the Black River and its tributaries. Recently, the Black River Watershed Management Plan was completed and this event will mark the end of the planning process and beginning of the project implementation phase.

The Black River Trash Bash, organized by the Lewis County Soil and Water Conservation District and the Tug Hill Commission and with great assistance from the Tug Hill Tomorrow Land Trust, will be held over two Saturdays in October. "Beach Captains" have volunteered to lead the efforts in seven areas in the Black River watershed.

On October 2nd, beginning at 9:00 a.m., volunteers will be cleaning up two areas in Lyons Falls. One area is in the village of Lyons Falls and the other is at Burdick's Crossing. For more information on the

Two sites in Port Leyden are going to be cleaned up on October 9th. They are at the Main Street Bridge in the village of Port Leyden and at the Davis Bridge Road. Families, children and community organizations, such as scouts, are encouraged to attend. Volunteers will be provided with water, gloves, garbage bags and data cards by the American Littoral Society (ALS). Volunteers will be logging the types of trash collected on data cards provided by the ALS. This data will be sent to the ALS and included in their annual worldwide beach cleanup day report, along with similar data from all over the world! The report summarizes the types and amount of trash cleaned off our waters' edges.

All you need to do is bring yourself and a can-do attitude. Please contact one of the beach captains above if you'd like to participate.

The Black River, winding from Forestport to Dexter, is one of the North Country's most important natural resources. The Black River Trash Bash is a watershed-wide event to clean up along the river and document what litters our shores. Data will be

compiled and sent to the American Littoral Society (ALS), which will use the data to devise strategies to combat pollution. We also hope to increase public participation in solving the problem of litter and pollution and to increase public awareness and appreciation of the River.

This event is being sponsored in part by the ALS, which conducts an annual world-wide beach cleanup day. The event is being organized locally by the Lewis County Soil and Water Conservation District and the Tug Hill Commission. Special thanks go out to the Tug Hill Tomorrow Land Trust for their assistance with the planning and advertising of this event. Many thanks go out to the captains of the 7 cleanup sites. 2010 CONFERENCE FOR LAKE, STREAM AND WATERSHED ISSUES – IT ALL FLOWS DOWNHILL!

The Central New York Regional Planning and Development Board and the Herkimer-Oneida Counties Comprehensive Planning Program are offering a workshop on a variety of water quality issues. The Conference for Lakes, Streams and Watershed Issues – It All Flows Downhill is scheduled for Friday, October 22 at Hamilton College, Fillius Events Center and Tolls Pavilion, Clinton, New York. Hamilton College will provide a shuttle service from campus parking lots for conference attendees. Topics for the conference will include:

- Climate Impacts on Lake Level Changes
- Local Options for Funding Lake, Stream and Watershed Projects
- Green Infrastructure for Stormwater Management
- The Invasive Species Challenge in NY's Land and Water Environments: A Call for Action
- Determining the Influence of Surface Water on Municipal Groundwater Supply Systems

The sessions are targeted for local, county, regional and state agencies; city, town and village officials; environmental organizations; lake associations; engineering and consulting firms. The training is eligible for annual training credits for planning board and zoning board of appeals members. The governing board of each municipality determines what training is eligible to meet the yearly training requirements. Please check with your governing board.

Pre-registration is required no later than **October 15**, **2010**. A registration fee of \$25will cover costs for conference materials, lunch and refreshments. THE LATEST NEWS FOR DOG LICENSING CHANGES IN 2011

Most town clerks are aware that on January 1, 2011, the NYS Department of Agriculture and Markets (A&M) will no longer provide dog tags, issue license renewals or maintain dog licensing data as a service to municipalities. Municipalities currently authorized to issue dog licenses will assume the remainder of the dog licensing functions, pursuant to Part T of Chapter 59 of the Laws of 2010.

To assist with this transition, A&M has established a "Municipal Dog Licensing Toolkit" that will be updated periodically as information is available. In addition, all municipal clerks, mayors and supervisors, dog control officers and contract animal shelters will receive concisely written guidance of the law changes and how they affect dog licensing, animal shelters and the Animal Population Control Fund. A&M cannot give specific legal advice about individual town's obligations and options under revised Article 7 and towns must rely on their own municipal attorney for such legal advice.

Town Boards need to consider when working on 2011 municipal budgets, the additional costs that will be incurred during 2011 when dog licensing will become a local government function.
