New York's Forests at a Glance (from DEC)

New York Land Area: 30.2 million acres

State Population: 19.4 million

•New York State forest area: 18.6 million acres, 61% of land area, about one acre per resident

Publicly-owned forest land: at least 3.7 million

acres

•Privately-owned forest land area: 14.4 million acres; 76% of forest land; owned by 687,000 landowners

•Number of tree species: more than 100 commercial and non-commercial, most common forest type: maple/beech/birch (53% of forest land area)



Forest Legacy Program



Forest Legacy Program (FLP)

- Purpose
- History
- Implemented by the States
- Projects can be fully acquired OR conservation easement
- Projects selected on a Nationally competitive basis

Full Purchase or Conservation Easement


- Land or CE must be acquired by the State
- Land or CE must be in a designated Forest Legacy Area
- FLP can provide up to 75% of the total costs
 - The 25% must be from non-federal sources




75% FLP



25% Non- Federal












FLP Accomplishments in the Tug Hill Area



FLP Accomplishments

New York State

- 13 projects
- 135,820 acres
- \$34,264,000 total value
- \$12,060,400 from FLP



FLP funding

- The program is funded through the Land and Water Conservation Fund
- Great American Outdoors Act signed into law August 2020
- FLP 2016-2020 Average
 ~\$64,000,000 a year
- FLP 2021 \$94,255,000

FLP Project Timeline

- Next Round is for FY2023 funding
- Applications due to State by summer 2021
- State submits applications to FS in fall 2021
- Winter 2022/2023 final project list
- If a project is funded the goal is to complete the project in 2 years or less



Community Forest and Open Space Conservation Program



Community Forest Program (CFP)

- Purpose
- History
- Implemented at the local level
- Projects are for full acquisition, NO conservation easements
- Projects selected on a Nationally competitive basis

Eligible Land

Private forest lands that:

- 1) Are threatened by conversion to nonforest uses;
- Are not lands held in trust by the United States; and
- If acquired by an eligible entity, can provide defined community benefits under the CFP and allow public access.

Public Benefits

- Economic
- Educational
- Environmental
- Recreational

Community Involvement

Acquisition

- Land can be acquired by:
 - Local units of Government
 - Eligible non-profit organization
 - Federally recognized Tribes
- CFP can provide up to 50% of the total costs
 - The other 50% must be from non-federal sources

CFP funding

- The program is funded through general appropriation, NOT LWCF
- CFP 2010
- CFP 2011
- CFP 2012-2017
- CFP 2018-2021

- \$500,000
- \$1,000,000
- \$2,000,000 each year
- \$4,000,000 each year
