# Municipal Solar Energy Development Survey, July 22 Deadline

Solar energy siting is accelerating across New York, and the New York State Association of Towns and American Farmland Trust want to hear from you about your experience with solar energy development within your town, opinions on where solar arrays should and should not be sited on farmland, and what resources you have and need to balance renewable energy generation and farmland protection. Your input, opinions, and needs are central to this project, and so your participation is essential. Please take 20-25 minutes to complete this short survey before Friday, July 23 to help guide smart solar siting decisions and policies at the state and local level in the future!

Only one response per town or county is needed. The person best suited to take the survey is someone who is involved with:

- Crafting local solar laws;
- Crafting local farmland preservation laws;
- Crafting master plans that encompass solar;
- Evaluating solar proposals that have come before the board;
- Training received / needed on solar and / or farmland preservation;
- Local town board or land-use board with no experience, but in need.

# 2021 Transportation Alternatives Program Grants Due September 29

The New York State Department of Transportation (NYSDOT) is making funding available to support bicycle, pedestrian, multi-use path, and non-motorized transportation-related projects and programs. Formally known as the Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) and the Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement Program (CMAQ), these funding sources provide reimbursement of up to 80 percent of project-related costs, with the remaining 20 percent provided by project sponsors.

2021 TAP-CMAQ applications are completed and submitted through the NYS Grants Gateway. Projects will be selected through a competitive solicitation process and evaluated on established criteria which include project type, eligible funding source, significance, cost-effectiveness, geographic balance, and benefits to overall investments to mitigate greenhouse gas emissions in Environmental Justice Communities. Projects must be related to surface transportation. Applications for funding may be developed by any municipality or non-profit incorporated group, but projects must be sponsored either by a municipality, a state agency, or public authority eligible to administer federal TAP and CMAQ transportation funds. ### 2021-22 JCAP Grants Available

The Justice Court Assistance Plan (JCAP) grants for 2021/22 are now available. The Unified Court System's budget includes \$3 million in JCAP funding for this fiscal year, with the maximum grant amount per court at \$30,000 (joint applications may have a maximum amount of \$60,000). All town and village courts can apply for funding in many areas including office equipment and furniture, security equipment and court room and court facility improvements and renovations.

The application must be filed by justice court personnel, so if boards are aware of an area needing funding, they should coordinate with their court personnel to apply. The deadline to apply is **October 7, 2021.** Most of the application must be submitted online, with the signature page, board resolution, estimates and the courts budget required to be sent separately via U. S. mail or email. Court personnel will be able to access the town and village courts website for all pertinent information at <a href="https://www.nycourts.gov/courts/townandvillage/judges\_only/jcap.shtml">www.nycourts.gov/courts/townandvillage/judges\_only/jcap.shtml</a>. Specific guidelines for the board resolution or for requests for construction or security equipment are also available on the webpage. Since the JCAP program was established in 1999, local justice courts have received over \$35 million in equipment and other resources. There was \$3 million available for the 2020/21 JCAP grant cycle and 299 applications were received with awards issued to 187 courts.

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# **Oneida County Updates AG-Friendly Municipal Guide**

Oneida County released an updated and refreshed "Agriculture-Friendly Oneida County" municipal planning guide last month, a document that aids local towns in developing comprehensive plans and policies, establishing agricultural districts, receiving agricultural assessments and setting up land use regulations. The updated document addresses the changing agricultural landscape as it pertains to renewable energy, including the use of agricultural land for solar arrays and other renewable energy uses.

The purpose of the guide is to provide municipalities with:

- A reference guide to be used in developing comprehensive plans and land use regulations, i.e. zoning regulations or amendments to those documents.
- Information regarding current agricultural—related laws and programs such as NYS Agricultural Districts Law, Agricultural Assessments and Farmland Protection Implementation Grants —that they can support and would encourage landowner participation.
- Information on the process to develop Carbon-Free Energy Sources (Wind and Solar Arrays) on agricultural land.
- A checklist of items they can use to determine if their municipality is agriculture-friendly.
- Information on the characteristics of agriculture-friendly comprehensive plans, land use regulations and municipal policies.
- Information on additional steps municipalities can take on their own to further farmland protection in their municipality, such as a Right to Farm Law or Municipal Farmland Protection Plan.
- Samples of agriculture-related definitions municipalities can use when developing and updating land use regulations. A list of resources municipalities can refer to when adopting or amending comprehensive plans and land use regulations.
- The identification of county contacts municipalities can rely on when adopting or amending comprehensive plans and land use regulations.
- Assistance in the creation of a uniform approach in developing plans, policies and regulations for agriculture throughout the county.

Oneida County Department of Planning and Cornell Cooperative Extension Oneida County staff will be providing further assistance by working with municipalities to develop ag-friendly comprehensive plans, land use regulations and municipal farmland protection plans.


# State Comptroller Announces Tax Levy Limit for 2022 Town Budgets

State Comptroller Thomas DiNapoli has announced the tax levy limit for local government units whose fiscal years end December 31. These local governments, which include towns and counties, will have a tax levy limit of 2.00% for the 2022 fiscal year, an increase over the 2021 limit of 1.56%. The tax levy limit has been at 2% for three of the past four years.
