

Upcoming Historical Programs at the Oneida County History Center

The Oneida County History Center is a great resource for anyone interested in the history of Oneida County. It was founded in 1876 and has been collecting, preserving, and sharing history ever since. Services offered by the history center include a research library, a gallery, exhibits, a bookstore, and weekly programs that feature authors, historians, and other guests. History Center staff have put together interesting programs over this upcoming winter that might be of interest to Tug Hill residents. The first is *Charles Finney & George Gale: The Westerville Connection* on January 8, 2022, at 1:00 p.m., which highlights the abolition movement in Oneida County and connects well with the Underground Railroad Webinar Series that the commission hosted this year (watch on the commission's YouTube channel here). The second is *Eight-Foot Drifts! Snowplowing in Oneida County in the 1930s and 1940s* with Ernest Porter on January 15, 2022, at 1:00 p.m. Ernest Portner is the son of Leigh Portner who recently shared his knowledge of the logging practices on the Moose River plains in the early 1900s, which you can watch here. Ernest will be sharing Leigh's home movies of Linn Tractors and plowing some of the great snowstorms of the 20th century. Out-out Deadline Approaches for Cannabis Dispensaries and Facilities

December 31, 2021, is the last opportunity for communities to opt-out of cannabis retail dispensaries and/or on-site cannabis consumption facilities. If your community has not done so, now is the time to pass your local law to opt-out of cannabis dispensaries or facilities before it is too late. Information on the detailed opt-out procedure is available from commission staff. NYS Association of Towns recommends holding some public hearings or roundtables if you want to hear how the public feels about the issue and what the likelihood would be of a petition being submitted, since the town or village does NOT have the right to hold a permissive referendum of their own initiative. In other words, the only way a permissive referendum happens is if the petition with the appropriate number of signatures is submitted within 45 days of local law adoption.

Regarding timelines, if the local law is adopted prior to December 31, 2021, the town or village followed proper procedure. The 45-day clock that starts after adoption can run into 2022, but the law (step 1 above) must be passed before the end of this year. The commission recommends watching: The New Cannabis Law: Considerations for Towns and Villages - YouTube on our YouTube channel, in which the NYS Association of Towns and the NY Conference of Mayors put together useful information regarding the new cannabis law. Lastly, if you are interested in what other communities have done with regards to cannabis, review the Adult-Use Municipality Opt-In/Opt-Out - Google My Maps, which provides a useful visual of where other communities fall on the cannabis spectrum. Amboy to Hear Public Comments on Cannabis Opt-Out Law and Zoning Amendments

Over the past few months, the commission has been working with the town of Amboy to provide guidance on opting out of cannabis retail dispensaries and on-site consumption facilities. The town of Amboy planning board and town board have also reviewed zoning amendments that reflect the community's desire to regulate solar energy, wind energy, and battery energy storage systems. The town board will hear public comments on both proposals on December 20, 2021, at 6:00 p.m. in the town hall located at 822 State Route 69. "Regulating Short-Term Rentals" Issue Paper Under Review

The Tug Hill Commission has a long list of issue and technical papers that are revised as necessary, can be seen on our website: <u>Technical & Issue Papers – NEW YORK STATE (tughill.org)</u>. As emerging issues arise in communities in the region, commission staff begin researching the issue and prepare papers that use plain language to communicate often complex issues. The commission will be releasing a new issue paper early in 2022 titled "Regulating Short-Term Rentals," in which lessons learned from other places, current New York State case law findings, and possible land use regulations and administration will all be highlighted. A template local law will be provided as an appendix of the issue paper.

Vienna Comprehensive Plan Update in Progress

The town of Vienna will hold a public hearing Wednesday, December 15 on an updated comprehensive plan. The plan, developed by a committee made up of planning board members, town board members and other representatives from the community, is intended to prioritize capital investments and provide direction for future development within the community. The plan provides a framework for the existing zoning and land subdivision controls and will help assure that growth will be in accordance with existing plans for future water, sewer, and road development.

Wildlife Management Areas Regulations Change Soon

Effective January 1, 2022, new regulations will apply to public use of state Wildlife Management Areas. These are the first updates to Wildlife Management Areas in over 25 years. These regulations generally include restrictions on motor vehicles and some motorized equipment; restrictions on discharge of firearms; restrictions of the use of boats to electric or non-powered boats; requirements that dogs be kept on a leash and under control (with certain exceptions when hunting or training); and measures to prevent introduction of aquatic invasive species.

Oneida County Youth Bureau Seeks Funding Applications for 2022 Programming

The Oneida County Youth Bureau is accepting proposals from interested non-profit organizations and cities, towns, and villages that would like the opportunity to provide youth-oriented programs that offer delinquency prevention, recreation, and positive youth development opportunities during 2022. The youth bureau allocates revenue from the NYS Office of Children and Family Services in the ways that best meet the local need. This program allows agencies and municipalities to seek funding for new and existing programs.

Two categories of funding are available: Youth Development Program (YDP) funding for non-profit agencies and cities, towns, and villages that operate a youth development program that provides direct services to youth. The state will reimburse for qualified expenditures, subject to available appropriations and exclusive of federal funding. Runaway and Homeless Youth Act (RHYA) funding or non-profit agencies that provide crisis and transitional living services. A 40% agency match is required.

Programs must meet guidelines established by the NYS Office of Children and Family Services to be funded are available online at www.ocgov.net/youth.
