



1883

"In 1841, a bridge was built over Fish creek, and a road opened from the town of Lee, near the line of the old road of 1805, ... the bridge was swept off in the winter of 1842-43, and soon rebuilt, and in 1843, a mill was built by Mr. Herron, and afterwards owned by David L. Swancott."

History of Lewis County by Franklin Hough, 1883, page 251

"Among some of the early sawmills operating in the town of Lewis in 1895-6 were....Swancott's."

"Swancott's mill in the western part of the town was burned to the ground on February 7, 1907. The mill had employed about thirty men and David Swancott of Lee Center was the owner at that time. It was evidently rebuilt as records indicate that on October 28, 1919, the Tug Hill Lumber Co. with principal offices at Swancott's mill in the town of Lewis, filed a certificate of incorporation with the Secretary of State, for the purpose of dealing in timber and timber lands, stumpage and real estate of every description. Directors the first year were Thomas W. Swancott of Lee Center, F.C. Hopkins, P.J. Jones and C.R. Dewey of Utica, and Frederick E. Beck of New Hartford. In 1965 this property was owned by Joseph and Chester Kwasniewski. A large new mill was built and the business was known as the J. & C. Lumber Company."









Swancott's Mills looking south on Creek Road



Sawmill at Swancott's Mills, early 1900's








Investors incorporated the Rome & Osceola Railroad Co. in 1908 with the intention of extracting an estimated 375 million feet of lumber from southwestern Lewis County. The rail line was to run 25.5 miles from Rome to Swancott's Mill in the Town of Lewis. Extensive grading was completed, but the project was finally abandoned in 1924. This photograph shows an American Railroad Ditcher, a piece of equipment that could be used as a steam shovel or as a pile driver. (Town of Osceola.)



Between 1840 and 1860, an estimated two-thirds of the world's bird's-eye maple was cut in Lewis County. Some of it came from the settlement of Swancott's Mill, named for David L. Swancott, who built a sawmill on Fish Creek in 1843. In this photograph, four young men, rifles ready, head off to the hunt. The name "Fish Creek" commemorates the great number of Atlantic salmon that once spawned in the stream and which the Iroquois snagged in their weirs. (Ed Fynmore collection.)


