(1A) Policies and Procedures for Managing Your Local Government

(3A) State and Federal Funding: Financing and Resources for Municipalities

With public funding for infrastructure and community development at historic levels, it is more important than ever to be prepared to capitalize on these investments. (3B) First Amendment Audits: What Are They and How Can Government Officials Respond

The proliferation of video cameras on mobile devices coupled with growing online political activism has resulted in an explosion of First Amendment audit activity in the past 24 months. YouTube videos of these audits are ubiquitous, showing an individual walking through municipal buildings recording local officials and employees doing their jobs and residents there to conduct municipal business. The videos invariably include scenes of altercations with distressed municipal employees who frequently respond to these auditors in an agitated, confrontational manner. This presentation will provide an overview of what a First Amendment audit is and how local officials can respond to such activities.

(3C) Understanding Site & Subdivision Plans for the Approval Process

This session will cover the basic fundamentals for planning, zoning and municipal board members for understanding how to properly interpret the drawings as they apply to the approval requirements. (4A) The Open Meetings Law: Demystifying the New Videoconference Procedures

The Open Meetings Law (OML) was first amended to allow public bodies to conduct meetings via videoconference back in 2000. As a result of the COVID pandemic, a more flexible although temporary method of conducting meetings was authorized via executive order. New York's experience with this temporary method of conducting meetings led the State to enact new procedures for conducting meetings via videoconference. This session will provide a full explanation of New York's OML, including the procedures for conducting meetings using videoconference technology. The presentation will also highlight recent changes to the OML regarding the public's right to access records that are scheduled to be discussed at meetings, the definition of "public body," and the posting of meeting minutes.

(4B) Lake Effect and Lightning (LEE) – A "Shocking" SUNY Oswego Project

The SUNY Oswego LEE project is funded by the National Science Foundation to study the electrification in lake-effect storms. The two main questions are: 1) How do lake effect storms become electrified? 2) Do wind turbines initiate lightning during these storms and under what conditions do these turbines initiative lightning, if so? Sites across Tug Hill hosted weather stations during the winter of 2022-23. Additionally, students launched weather balloons and a Doppler on wheels traversed Tug Hill during lake effect storms. Learn more about this study and how the results will be used.

(4C) Hot Button Land Use Issues

Local governments are not able to regulate all uses the same way. Some uses have special statutory protection or rules established through case law and require special consideration, such as religious uses, mining, and telecommunications facilities. Other uses might be new to the local officials attempting to regulate them, such as solar energy facilities, barn weddings, and short-term rentals. This course is an overview of some of the land uses that many local officials find challenging, along with the statutory rules and case law associated with them and options for regulating them.
