New Tug Hill Housing Analysis Issue Paper; Comprehensive Plan Technical Paper Update

Tug Hill Commission recently completed a new issue paper, *NYS Climate Policy: A Tug Hill Housing Analysis*, which seeks to portray the scope of climate policy in New York State and its impact on Tug Hill residents. The paper captures the current conditions of housing in the Tug Hill region, including age of housing stock and primary heating method, and then lays out the climate policies expectations for homes to compare the gap between the two. The paper discusses certain challenges for the Tug Hill region such as the rural nature of the hill, cost of energy saving renovations to homes, and the electrification of appliances as well as increased cost of electricity. The data was compiled from various sources and there are many citations throughout the paper. This document can be useful for local governments to understand the current situation with regards to housing and existing energy conditions, and where to look for community funding, as well for individual homeowners to look for funding for home upgrades. Updated Tug Hill Sages Photos & Biographies


Last year, the NYS Tug Hill Commission celebrated 50 years of serving the towns

Grant Opportunity: Park and Trail Partnership Grants

Parks & Trails New York (PTNY), working with the NY Office of Parks, Recreation, and Historic Preservation (OPRHP) and funded through the Environmental Protection Fund, has announced the opening of Round 10 of its annual application process.

WHO: This program is for registered charities and 501(c)3 not-for-profit organizations whose missions reflect the preservation, stewardship, interpretation, education, maintenance, and/or promotion of a New York State Park trail, historic site, or public land under the jurisdiction of OPRHP or NYSDEC. Check PTNY's <u>eligibility page</u> for greater detail.

WHAT: This funding is meant to 1) Enhance the preservation, stewardship, interpretation, maintenance, and promotion of NYS parks, trails, state historic sites and public lands, 2) Increase the sustainability, effectiveness, capacity of non-profit organizations that promote, maintain, and support NYS parks, trails, historic sites, and public lands, and 3) Promote tourism and economic development benefit of outdoor recreation through the growth and expansion of a connected statewide network of parks, trails, greenways, and public lands.

WHEN: The application period opens May 15, 2024. Professional development letters of intent are due June 24, 2024. Invited applicants must submit their full application by Wednesday, August 28, 2024.

WHERE: The application process for this grant is supported by a <u>PTNY online portal</u>. There are opportunities for prospective applicants to register for informational webinars on this topic, occurring in June. Sand to Solid Bedding Agriculture Workshop Held

Jefferson and Lewis County Soil and Water Conservation Districts, in collaboration with Cornell University and Cooperative Extension, hosted an agricultural workshop called "Thinking about converting from sand to solid bedding?" on April 3 in Sackets Harbor. Jenifer Wightman, from Cornell University, provided an overview of the agriculture section of New York's Scoping Plan to explain why reducing methane and nitrous oxide emissions is important to help meet the 2030 and 2050 reduction goals for greenhouse gas emissions.

The workshop provided benefits, drawbacks, and management requirements of sand and solid bedding, implications to cow health, and information on the New York Phosphorus Index 2.0. A panel discussion was held with three dairy farmers from Adams (Sheland Farm), Auburn (Patterson Farm), and Le Roy (Stein Farms). They



discussed bedding techniques and management practices used to find success in their dairy businesses. The workshop concluded with a funding panel that described various Natural Resources Conservation Service grant opportunities available to farmers. How does this relate to the Tug Hill region? As farmers learn more effective ways to manage manure benefits, it leads to better nutrient management, improved water quality and watershed health (e.g., the Black River watershed), and reduced greenhouse gas emissions.

Kristin O'Neill, deputy director and counsel for the Committee on Open Government, will present a virtual Freedom of Information Law information session on Monday, May 6, 2024, from 10:00 - 11:30 a.m. and then a virtual Open Meetings Law information session later the same day from 2:00 - 3:30 p.m. Registration is needed for both, and each program will consist of a one-



hour overview of the statute, followed by 30 minutes of a question-and-answer period. There is no cost to attend either webinar, but registration is required. ANCA Clean Energy Conference May 20-21, Clayton

The Adirondack North Country Association (ANCA) is holding its 2024 Clean Energy Conference in Clayton on May 20 and 21, 2024. Community members, stakeholders, educators, and advocates are invited to convene around current clean energy issues at the regional nonprofit's annual Clean Energy Conference. The two-day event will feature tours, presentations and networking opportunities designed to advance clean energy initiatives that benefit New York communities, businesses, and residents. Registration is open at www.adirondack.org/clean-energyconference.

Through tours, presentations and breakout sessions, participants will learn from experts about topics including workforce development in the energy sector, hydropower, the electric school bus transition, climate justice, New York's Regional Clean Energy Hubs, and equitable access to project funding. Conference presenters and exhibitors will also share information about local, state, and federal initiatives that support residential, business, and municipal energy projects.

The event will begin at noon on Monday, May 20 with an afternoon tour of Brookfield Renewable's historic Black River hydropower facility, followed by a conference reception at the 1000 Islands Harbor Hotel. Limited spots are available for a sunset boat cruise on the St. Lawrence River. On Tuesday, May 21, 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., the conference will feature presentations and breakout sessions, a poster exhibition, tour of a Blue Bird electric school bus, raffle giveaway, and opportunities to network with conference exhibitors including contractors, service providers, nonprofits and others working to expand clean energy initiatives across New York State.

Participants who find the cost of registration or travel to be a barrier are invited to inquire about financial support.
