

2023 Headwaters Released


Hot Off the Press: Tug Hill Recreation Guide Refresh

Several editions of this guide have been developed and released over the years to help promote visitation and non-motorized recreation on and around the Tug Hill region. Showcasing trails, activities, and community features throughout portions of Jefferson, Lewis, Oneida, and Oswego counties, this guide is designed to be family-friendly, useful for incoming tourists and locals alike, and to encourage people to get outdoors and enjoy all the natural beauty that Tug Hill has to offer.



The Tug Hill Recreation Guide is produced in partnership between the NYS Tug Hill Commission, Tug Hill Tomorrow Land Trust, 1000 Islands International Tourism Council, Naturally Lewis, Oneida County Tourism, and Oswego County Tourism. In addition to partner support, this update and reprint was also supported by "Market New York" (I Love NY) matching funds.

Lead Service Line Inventory Workshop Materials Available

On March 26, the NYS Tug Hill Commission partnered with the <u>New York Rural Water Association</u> (NYRWA) to present on the federal Lead and Copper Rule Revisions (LCRR) and Lead Service Line Inventories (LSLIs) in Lee. This workshop aimed at providing municipalities and public utilities with any remaining information they may need to start or complete their initial LSLI by this year's October deadline.

Jamie Herman, CEO of NYRWA, presented to a little over 50 people both in the Lee Town Hall and those who attended virtually via Zoom. He was assisted by fellow New York Rural Water experts Mark Roberts, technical assistance, and Steve Freeman, a water technician, in answering questions. Attendees included town and village employees and officials, engineers, water operators, planning staff, and health department staff.



Tug Hill Presents in the Mohawk Valley

On Wednesday April 3, the Mohawk Valley Institute for Learning in Retirement (MVILR) organization hosted the NYS Tug Hill Commission's John Healt for a presentation on the Tug Hill Commission. Held in the Festine Auditorium on Mohawk Valley Community College's Rome campus, the presentation included a description of the Tug Hill Plat-



eau, including the weather, energy production and what drives the economy. A brief history of the commission, how it operates and assists the municipalities within the Tug Hill region, and a description of the five councils of governments were also included in the presentation. The session ended with a viewing of the "Park It" video created by the Watertown PBS station, commemorating the Tug Hill Commission's 50th anniversary. More than 30 attendees participated in the event.

The Mohawk Valley Institute for Learning in Retirement is a non-profit organization that has provided opportunities for local seniors to "learn, live, grow, move, think, socialize, and create" since 1996. MVILR has partnered with MVCC's Center for Corporate and Community Education to continue providing local retirees with rich learning opportunities without homework, exams, or grades. MVILR is located at MVCC's Rome campus, which features large, dedicated classrooms for its courses, state-of-the-art special event spaces, and free parking. Class registration begins 25 calendar days before the start of the first class of the semester. Courses range in format from large lectures to small discussions taught by volunteer facilitators, members, and guest professionals who enjoy sharing their expertise, talents, interests, and enthusiasm for lifelong learning.

WIIA and IMG Grants for Clean Water Infrastructure Projects

The Environmental Facilities Corporation (EFC) has posted an instructional video to help local governments apply for \$325 million in grants available through the <u>Water Infrastructure Improvement (WIIA) and Intermunicipal Water Infrastructure Grant (IMG) programs</u>. National Weather Service to Host SKYWARN Training

The National Weather Service (NWS) out of Buffalo, NY, will host a free SKYWARN training session on Tuesday, April 30, at 5:00 p.m. at the Roswell P. Flower Memorial Library in Watertown. This training is open to the public. SKYWARN™ is a national effort to save lives during severe weather emergencies with an expanding network of trained weather spotters. The services performed by SKYWARN™ spotters have saved many lives.

By providing observations, SKYWARN™ spotters assist NWS members in warning decisions and enable the NWS to fulfill its mission of protecting life and property. The basic training session provides a brief overview of the NWS (e.g., the organization and responsibilities), severe weather safety tips, and basic severe weather meteorology, including how thunderstorms, severe thunderstorms, tornadoes, and flash floods form. Training sessions last about two hours.

Broadband Challenge Public Comment Closes April 11

Through the Challenge Portal, the public can answer a series of questions about internet service available at a given location, upload evidence to support a potential challenge, take and submit the results of a speed test, and/or submit a free text comment about the quality of their internet service in the NYS Broadband Challenge Portal. This information submitted by the public will be made available to eligible local and Tribal governments and nonprofit organizations registered in the portal to review and potentially incorporate into formal challenges during the challenge phase.

Additionally, the portal is accepting challenges until April 18 from registered eligible challengers. Local and Tribal governments, nonprofits, and Internet Service Providers are eligible challengers and must register to participate. <u>Learn about the challenge process and how to register</u>.

ConnectALL is hosting optional office hours throughout the process to provide technical assistance to eligible challengers navigating the portal. Register now, and bring your questions: <u>April 9, 2:00-3:00 p.m.</u>, <u>April 15, 1:00-2:00 p.m.</u>.
