On Thursday, May 16 the Cooperative Tug Hill Council (CTHC) will hold their annual spring meeting at the Steak and Brew Restaurant, 4497 NYS Route 26, Turin. Social hour will start at 6:00 p.m. with dinner at 7:00 p.m. and the business meeting to follow.

The meeting agenda includes a review of the fall 2023 meeting minutes and current financial report and election of 2024 officers. 

Department of Labor Employer Survey – May 10 Deadline

For the last three years, The Business Council has teamed up with the New York State Department of Labor (DOL) and Empire State Development to survey thousands of businesses on their challenges and needs. The New York Association of Training and Employment Professionals is also now a partner.

The state has then worked to address needs and challenges through new and revised processes, programs, and initiatives. Last year DOL secured more funding for teacher residency programs and developed new apprenticeships to help address survey results that suggested businesses were struggling most with hiring and retaining skilled workers. DOL also launched a digital literacy initiative and expanded no-cost online learning with Coursera. These are just a few examples of how your answers help create our solutions.









This year, the Department of Labor is again partnering to gather real-time feedback on the state of the workforce and the needs of businesses in 2024! This survey will take approximately 10-15 minutes to complete.

Municipalities Zero-emission Vehicle Rebate Program Open


The next round of DEC's Municipal Zero-emission Vehicle (ZEV) Rebate Program will provide \$750,000 to municipalities for the purchase or lease of zero-emission light- and medium-duty fleet vehicles. These municipal zero-emission vehicles will help New York achieve the greenhouse gas emission reduction requirements as part of the State's Climate Leadership and Community Protection Act (Climate Act).

Funding is available on a first-come, first-served basis starting April 25, 2024, on a rolling basis through September 27, 2024, or until funds are exhausted, whichever occurs first. Rebates are available to municipalities that purchase – or lease for a minimum of 36 months – an eligible vehicle placed into municipal service at a dealership in New York State between September 30, 2022 and September 27, 2024. All electric, plug-in hybrid, and hydrogen fuel cell vehicles are eligible for rebates.

Morning Bird Walk and Breeding Bird Survey, May 11, 2024, 8:00 a.m. - 10:00 a.m.

THTLT and the North Country Bird Club will join Jeff Bolsinger, New York State Breeding Bird Atlas III northern region co-coordinator, for a morning bird walk at the Joseph A. Blake Wildlife Sanctuary, 31241 Middle Rd, Watertown, to learn about and survey for breeding birds at the sanctuary. A Breeding Bird Atlas occurs every 20 years in New York for a five-year period. This third New York State atlas effort began in 2020, and birders of all backgrounds are participating through 2024.
