Tug Hill Region Represented at Rural Resources Fair in Albany

Commission staff, Jennifer Harvill (community and regional projects director) and Jillian Lee (project specialist), attended the third annual Rural Resources Fair on March 26 in Albany at the Legislative Office Building. Over 40 rural groups attended to raise awareness and highlight issues faced in rural communities, including but not limited to, housing, energy, agriculture, and education. Jennifer and Jillian spoke with several legislators, staff, and members of the public about the Tug Hill region. Conversations ranged from housing, education, recreation, climate, and more. Many people recognized the Tug Hill region for its recreational opportunities, while others had not heard of the region before and were very interested in learning more.

Fourth Article VII Application Submitted by National Grid

The proposed reconstruction of ~27 miles of 115kV transmission line between the Black River Substation in LeRay, Jefferson County, and the new Beaver River Substation in Croghan, Lewis County, has been submitted to the NYS Public Service Commission for their review and potential approval. National Grid split what was originally the Black River to Porter project into two separate projects, Black River-Beaver River and Beaver River-Porter. Links to all four projects on Tug Hill are provided below.

Taken together, the four pending Article VII projects encompass 42% (25 out of 59) of the communities in the legislated Tug Hill region, and 44% (27 out 62) of communities that belong to one of the region's five councils of governments.

Agricultural Development Conference Well-Attended

On Friday, April 4, Jefferson County Economic Development (JCED) hosted its agricultural development conference at Jefferson Community College. Attendees included local farmers and food producers, local businesses, commission staff, stakeholders in Jefferson County, and state representatives, among others. Agricultural coordinator and deputy CEO of JCED Jay Matteson credited this year's conference as being the result of its partnership with Jefferson Farm Bureau, as well as other agencies and partners.

Prior to the conference's opening remarks, a video produced by Development Authority of the North Country (DANC), "Agribusiness in Drum Country," was played for a public audience for the first time. The short video was developed by DANC and JCED to help attract more businesses to the area due to the unique opportunities in the North Country.

Presentations throughout the day emphasized several critical, timely topics: the importance of workplace development cross-generational understanding, navigating modern insurance needs and coverage options for farms, and the significance of understanding larger economic trends to create a resilient business. Attendees received presentations from the following experts: Mike Spaulding, Nationwide Insurance ("The Future of Insurance"); David Freund, Chief Leadership Officer from The Manufacturers Association of Central New York ("Tapping into Generations for Business Success"); and Danny Munch, Economist with American Farm Bureau Federation ("As the World Turns, a Guided Trip Through Our Economy").

Denmark Culvert Inventory Update

Culverts are essential for hazard mitigation, particularly in flood prevention, by safely directing water beneath roadways. The town of Denmark is currently collaborating with Lewis County on their hazard mitigation plan and decided to update its culvert inventory for this effort.

In 2013, Denmark participated in the Joint Infrastructure Management Initiative, which included an inventory of culverts. To ensure the data was current, the town put a request into the Tug Hill Commission to update the inventory. On March 25, several commission staff members spent the day in the field to perform the update. During this visit, the commission also took the opportunity to offer mapping training to the staff.

CTHC Spring Meeting April 29

On Tuesday, April 29 the Cooperative Tug Hill Council (CTHC) will hold their annual spring meeting at the Glenfield (3G) Fire Hall, 6229 Blue St., Glenfield. Social hour will start at 6:00 p.m. with dinner at 7:00 p.m. and the business meeting to follow. Business includes election of officers for 2025, adoption of goals for the year and many other topics. Officials from Lewis County are expected to be the speakers for the evening. Invitations with a tentative agenda have gone out, so please make reservations by April 22. The meeting portion of the evening is open to the public and free of charge, but additional guests who would like to attend the dinner will be charged \$42 each, payable at the venue. CTHC pays for two representatives' dinners from each municipality.

The CTHC executive committee recently interviewed and offered a contract to a new associate circuit rider to replace outgoing associate Beth Steria who has chosen not to renew her contract for 2025. Denali Dietrich has accepted the contract and started attending board meetings this month for the municipalities she will be covering going forward. Denali is Tug Hill circuit rider Mickey Dietrich's daughter and long-time executive committee member Doug Dietrich's granddaughter.

North Shore Council of Governments Spring Meeting Recap

On March 27, the North Shore Council of Governments (NorCOG) held its spring meeting at the West Monroe Municipal Building. Three of the four member municipalities were represented, and over a dozen local residents attended.

During the meeting, members participated in a brainstorming session for the economic resiliency study, explored potential new logos and branding concepts, and discussed a possible partnership with Oswego County Tourism on a collaborative project.

Bill Buchan provided an update on the Southern Oswego County Regional Interceptor Sewer (SOCRIS) project, noting that the initiative is now in the county's hands. There is optimism about applying for grant funding this summer. Bill and Heidi will collaborate to provide monthly updates moving forward.


NorCOG's next meeting is scheduled for June 26 at 7:00 p.m. at the Constantia Town Hall and will feature a guest speaker.

Commission Staff Attend NY Planning Federation Conference

The New York Planning Federation hosted their annual planning and zoning conference in Cooperstown April 6-8. Commission staff members Matt Johnson (planning director), Christopher Barboza and Maria Covey (planners), and Heidi Tompkins (circuit rider) attended the conference. With over 20 speakers, attendees from across the state had an opportunity to sit in six different sessions to learn more about a variety of planning and zoning related topics including land use allocation, large scale renewable energy permitting, area variances, and DEC freshwater wetland regulations. Commission staff attend the conference annually to keep on top of new planning topics, network with other professionals, and bring back ideas for the commission's annual local government conference.

Great Lakes Basin Small Grants Program Grants Due May 2

New York's Great Lakes Basin Small Grants Program 2025 application period is now open. New York Sea Grant, in partnership with DEC, is accepting proposals up to \$40,000 from non-profits, county and local governments, public agencies, and educational institutions, for projects that advance the Great Lakes Action Agenda and align with a locally supported community plan to address environmental challenges in New York's Great Lakes basin. These plans may focus on water quality, natural resources, or sustainable land use and include, but are not limited to, coastal lakeshore economy and resiliency regional plans, comprehensive plans, harbor management plans, hazard mitigation plans, local waterfront revitalization plans, natural resource management plans, Resilient NY flood mitigation studies, and watershed management plans.


- 1. Emerald Ash Borer Biocontrol Monitoring Workshop: Learn about and engage in biological control monitoring efforts.

Help Shape the EbA Co-Benefits Tool!

Ecosystem-based Adaptation (EbA) uses natural systems—like wetlands, forests, dunes and floodplains—to help communities adapt to climate risks while enhancing environmental and social benefits (see below).



What is this tool?

The EbA Co-Benefits Tool is designed to help communities identify ecosystem-based strategies that reduce hazards like flooding and erosion while providing co-benefits like habitat restoration, water quality improvement, and recreation opportunities. The tool prompts users to provide inputs about their concerns, and then provides EbA recommendations and information on associated co-benefits, as shown in the diagram on the right.



NYAOT and SUNY Potsdam Launch Microcredential Program in Grant Writing and GIS

The New York Association of Towns, in partnership with SUNY Potsdam, recently announced the launch of a workforce development initiative designed to improve recruitment and retention in towns, as well as create an accredited and skilled workforce.



Local government employees and candidates for employment can now earn microcredentials in the areas of <u>public sector grant writing</u> and <u>spatial data analysis with GIS</u>. A microcredential is a short course of study that focuses on a particular skill. All microcredentials will launch this summer and

will be offered online for maximum compatibility with work schedules. Course durations will vary from six weeks to two semesters.

Many smaller municipalities lack the resources to effectively research, apply for, and secure grants. Training in grant writing can help local governments access much-needed funding, while education in spatial data analysis with GIS enhances municipal planning and decision-making capabilities.

Additionally, these programs support the development of a workforce pipeline by preparing students for careers in local government. Enrolled college students, as well as individuals transitioning from the private to the public sector, will benefit from these opportunities to gain relevant, applicable skills that align with the needs of municipal employers.
